
A Message from your H.O.G. team





During the war Indian produced about 50,000 motorcycles for the war effort; Harley-Davidson produced over 20,000. Other U.S. brands found in Europe were Excelsior and Henderson.

Harley's motorcycle was based on the J Model, and used a 61 cubic inch F-head engine (15 HP). These bikes actually saw service on the front lines.




participation are highly valued and very much appreciated.



TO CONE OR NOT TO CONE - THAT IS THE QUESTION

I've been asked multiple times by fellow riders how they can get better at riding, and my answer is always the same. PRACTICE, PRACTICE.



Find an empty parking lot near your home and every time before your leave on a ride or return from a ride, spend 5-10 minutes practicing some slow riding maneuvers. Start with a simple figure 8.

Start by using a rectangle of 8 x 2 parking spaces (See picture above). A quick tip is don't fixate on crossover point of a figure




8, but rather do a complete circle one or two times, and then at the top or bottom of the circle turn your bars the opposite direction. This will allow you to start working on transitioning, which is key to slow riding drills.


The other thing I would suggest is to purchase small motorcycle cones from amazon (see cone picture above). Amazon Cone Link These little cones are easy to run over, they allow you to keep you balance when you do and are easy to carry in your saddlebag or tour pack.

Take your cones and start putting them into various patterns and start reducing your boundaries as you get better. A great resource for finding patters is to visit www.conepatterns.com Here you will find various patterns rated from Basic and Easy, Moderate, Difficult and Extreme. You most likely won't be able to do any of them right away, but don't get frustrated. Simply "kick-out" or widen the course to your ability. After some practice you will be able to reduce your path to your intended size.

Two of my favorites - "Right-Hand Maze" and "The Intersection" - are shown. Go out, give it a try and if you want someone to do it with you, give me a call!







Harleys on Vinyl!

Let's examine some of these Harley motorcycle covers. - Wes





Cheap Trick: In Color and in Black and White (1977) - This is the first

Hits (1973) - This is the second album I thought of; the First Lady of Blues Rock is on a Sportster, but there's no indication she was ever a motorcyclist.



shields on them, no doubt. (Remember, as F-HOGs you get a 10% discount at Patriot Harley-Davidson!)


The Crystals: "He's a Rebel" (1962) - A drawing of an old Harley - huge windshield.








VINTAGE RIDES:

PROJECT NOVA

(Gleaned from this article in ultimatemotorcycling.com)

Pretend it's 1976 and that you work at Harley-Davidson.

Management at AMF want you to create a motorcycle that breaks with Harley tradition to a great extent and offers competition to the Japanese on their own terms with a bike that not only looks nothing like the usual Harley, but uses a counterbalanced 60 degree V-4 (with a V-6 option) that could produce 136 HP.

Ladies and Gentlemen, Project Nova!

The fuel tank was placed not at the top as per Harley custom, but under the seat and the engine was Porsche-designed; is this beginning to sound a bit like the V-Rod?

At first the design was specified as shaft drive, but

a belt was decided upon later in the process. The Nova was also liquid-cooled, with the radiator - like the fuel tank - placed under the seat. An electric fan and specially-designed parts were needed to channel air to the radiator. (I wonder what that heat dissipation under the seat was like for the rider.)

Engine specifications seemed to have included a number of variants: a V-twin displacing 400cc or 500cc, a V-4 displacing 800cc or 1000cc and a V-6 displacing 1200cc or 1500cc. Perhaps most interesting of all, the engine served double duty

Tacilities, and survey for the surve

as a structural member and therefore no chassis down tubes were used on this bike, giving it a spare and clean front end.

The smooth, sleek saddlebags look reminiscent of recent model Harleys; compare them with the current Sportglide, for instance. And even the instrument cluster was different; I am guessing that some of the design ideas for this bike finally made their way into the V-Rod later on.



The fairing is more or less based on similar fairing designs common in the 1970s - it is possibly the component of the bike that is the most

conservative thing about it!

The prototype shown here is from 1981.

Where does one go to see this amazing bike? Only one place: The Harley-Davidson Museum in Milwaukee. -Wes.



BOOK REVIEW

Proficient Motorcycling: The Ultimate Guide to Riding Well by David L. Hough (Bowtie Press, 288 pgs., second edition 2008) The Fairfax County Library system has this book!

Do you consider yourself a motorcyclist or a biker? What's the difference? Attitude. To my way of thinking, a biker is something of an outlaw, whether in actuality or fantasy. A rule-breaker, a rebel, contemptuous of authority, out to ride hard and live free. A tee-shirt, or just a leather vest is the visual clue here.



A motorcyclist, on the other hand, is a deliberate, safety-minded, professional who rides defensively and respects the power and weight of his bike. You will see him wearing all the safety gear. And yes, I understand that a biker can have some of these traits and vice-versa, but I think you'll agree with me that there are two recognizable camps.

This is a book for sober motorcyclists who aspire to professionalism! It is very comprehensive and presents its material seriously. In fact, it's the only book I've seen that actually has sensible diagrams explaining the physics of cornering and counter-steering. By the time you finish this book you'll be exposed to a general, fully-fleshed out explanation of how motorcycling works and the guidelines for superior riding. Hough also has a wonderfully accessible writing style. Here are a couple of examples:

"If you allow another motorist to knock you down, you'll probably hear the same lame excuse: I didn't see you. Sometimes an errant driver has looked down at the poor motorcyclist lying miserably crunched under a bent motorcycle and let slip, "Gosh, I didn't see you. You were coming so fast, and you were wearing black leather, and besides, you didn't have your headlight turned on." Certainly there are occasions when the other driver really couldn't see the motorcyclist, but many vet-eran motorcyclists have long had a sneaking suspicion that the excuse is mostly a cop-out. When a driver attempts a sudden left turn in front of a motorcyclist and knocks the bike down, do we expect them to say, 'I saw you but I was in a hurry and I figured you'd get out of my way?'

"This oft-repeated 'I-didn't-see-you' excuse has led some safety experts to believe that the problem is simply that motorcycles are inconspicuous in traffic. The solution, theoretically, is to be more conspicuous. The suggestions are to wear brightly colored riding gear, add a modulator that flashes the headlight, and maybe screw on a Yosemite Sam Back Off mud flap.

"Most of the high-mileage riding friends I know roll their eyes at the conspicuity stuff. 'Friends don't let friends wear pink vests,' they would sneer. Perhaps the veterans have a more realistic understanding of the I-didn't-see-you myth. Does the conspicuity stuff really work, or is it more of a magic talisman than a dependable safety device? ... Conspicuity devices are based on the assumption that the other guy will get out of your way if he can only see you. The veterans know that avoiding collisions depends on being prepared to get out of the way of the other guy, whether he sees you or not."

This book is so thorough there is even a section on how to outwit an attacking dog!

"Apparently, for fun-seeking dogs, there isn't much sport in chasing something that is too easy to catch. The game is to calculate the speed of the approaching vehicle and dash out just in time to intercept it. Dogs typically have very good eyesight and hearing, so Fido often waits in the yard behind a bush or parked car, calculating a perfect intercept that he can reach if he sprints at top speed.

"When Fido catches you at the intercept point, you might be able to get in a lucky kick with your boot, but the odds are that the dog has better reflexes than you do. And if this dog happens to be aggressively defending his territory, it's best to avoid holding out any fresh meat, even if you think your


leathers could protect you against snarling fangs.
Besides, attempting to injure the dog makes you the aggressor in the eyes of some owners. The clever approach is to outsmart the




dog. One good tactic for outsmarting Fido is to change speed unexpectedly. Most dogs have a maximum speed of only about 30 mph, so it is easy to outrun them on a motorcycle. "If you slow down before entering Fido's turf, he predicts that he can wait a little longer before trotting off. Then, just as Fido gets up and starts racing toward the intercept point, screw on some throttle and accelerate out of range. Poor Fido gets left in the dust."

The sections on balancing and countersteering are especially good. (See illustration below.) Hough points out that due to gyroscopic forces, a motorcycle at speed will naturally want to stay balanced on a straight path. (I was delighted to observe this the first time I put my feet up on the pegs during my MSF class.) The act of cornering is really just temporarily unbalancing the bike. I've never thought about it this way before!

Really, I cannot recommend this book enough. It may just be the one motorcycle book you really need.



When the motorcycle begins to fall over, the location of the front tire contact ring moves slightly, increasing drag on that side of the tire and countersteering the front wheel back under the center of mass.




As the front wheel steers itself back under the mass, the bike is rolled upright and balanced again but on a slightly different path.

Movie Review: Biker Dreams

1998, Unrated, Director: Adam Berman. Stars Martin Tobias, Alex Landes, Jim "Liddo" Cornett, "Scorpio" Cornett. Plot: A documentary about the people who ride their motorcycles around America. Filmed during the 1996 annual biker run held at Sturgis, South Dakota, it takes a

close look at some of the different types of people who ride motorbikes, showing that they're not what popular stereotypes have portrayed them to be. Among the people followed are Alex and Martin, a middle-aged couple planning to attend the festival together, Ilene, who comes from a long line of bikers, and the roughlooking "Liddo" Jim, head of a group called the Ressurection Motorcycle Club. Available via Netflix DVD.



This production seemed unpromising at start, but the surprising thing about it is how you're gradually drawn in by the personalities and their narratives. There's a telegenic young couple who make their way to Sturgis to be married (whether they planned this or not is unmentioned), and there's no other word for them than "cute." Contrasted with this is Jim "Liddo" Cornett, who is, well... rather nasty. He unforgettably describes the entrance requirement for his first motorcycle club; I shall not elaborate other than to say that it involves animals and that I am very glad it is not also the entrance requirement for the F-HOGs.

There is also an amusing, self-effacing bunch of RUBs (Rich Urban Bikers) who call themselves the Hamsters and who wear yellow tee shirts to signal their pacifist outlook. (They remind me of a local rugby club composed of old boys who named themselves The Poltroons; they had "Hostile - Senile - Fragile" embossed on their jerseys.)

This production is well worth your time! A much better review than I'm willing to write is here. - Wes

THE DAVIDSON COTTAGE

You can rent a stay in the Davidson grandfather's cottage! Honest.


The whole story is included in the link above, but, told quickly, in 2008 three Harley enthusiasts found the cottage, which was crumbling away. However, the property was on the market, and so they bought the cottage and set up a trust, the Davidson Legacy, to save the site. It took the team four years to rebuild the little cottage to what it looked like when William Davidson left there for the States.

Local bikers helped out with the cleanup effort, and ti wasn't long before Harley enthusiasts from the USA, Australia, France, Italy, Spain and Switzerland began to visit the place to have their pictures taken. The restored cottage is now a Scottish pilgrimage site.






Above left: The exterior with somebody's Harley parked out front.

Left: A famous photograph: William A., Walter and Arthur Davidson with William Harley, 1920.



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


