This is no small task. Because we have these



FHOG Riders Seminar

The Fairfax VA H.O.G. Chapter is committed to educating and improving new and existing Chapter members' riding skills and knowledge. Our educational program assists our Chapter members in understanding the Fairfax VA HOG fundamentals of group riding, how to ride with a passenger, and reviews skills and responsibilities should you wish to take the next steps to become a Fairfax HOG Road Captain. Seminars are held most months from April through August and cover topics including:

- Basic rider safety
- Alcohol and accident awareness
- Group riding dynamics and procedures
- Staggered and single-file formations
- Hand signals
- Staging and parking
- Passing and lane changes
- Rider/Passenger communication
- Rider/Passenger mounting and dismounting
- Road Captain responsibilities
- Incident management

The 90-minute sessions are conducted rain or shine by dedicated volunteers of our Chapter and take place at various locations (check below for exact location).

Weather permitting, a members-only Chapter ride will be held after each seminar. The ride will give participants an opportunity to practice group riding skills, receive constructive feedback, and if desired, they can begin the process of becoming a Fairfax HOG Road Captain.

Report: Regional Officer Conference

In January, the FHOG officer team attended the 2020 HOG Regional Officer Conference (ROC) in Midlothian, Virginia. Ray Riddle, Jack Causa, Ed Murphy, Anthony Rahner, Ollie Pluntke, Courtney Scott and JD



Morrissette represented our Chapter. The regional training also brought in HOG chapters from Maryland and North Carolina. There were over 100 people in attendance. The one-day session was set up to promote the Harley-Davidson brand, address current issues, exchange best practices, answer questions and network with other HOG members.

It was evident that all chapters deal with many of the same issues:

maintaining and increasing membership, participation in rides and events, and keeping events fresh and exciting. Some of the recommendations were: be welcoming, invite and engage membership (especially new members), have fewer rules and more riding, have a positive relationship with the sponsoring dealership, and the most important—have fun. There was

discussion on the value of being a HOG member and how to sell this. The common theme was back to basics: We are a riding club and should place the emphasis on riding events.

The presenters focused on some key issues to take back to the chapters. Renewals are for a calendar year (January 1 to December 31) and require a yearly signed waiver (before participating in any ride). No alcohol is allowed on Chapter rides, and ensure that reports are made for any accidents or incidents. Chapter Officers should be the last people to



leave a room or event in order to lead by example. An associate member can be a HOG Officer and could be a non-rider or not ride a Harley.

Mother HOG encourages caution when collecting and distributing funds for charitable organizations.

This conference also provided quality time for the chapter officers to build internal relationships, discuss chapter activities, and develop plans for the upcoming year. It was great to meet and talk to so many other HOG members in other chapters. We all start in the same place and with the same objectives, but each chapter is unique. They are also genuinely good people who want to do what we do: ride and have fun!

All in attendance felt the time was well

spent and came away with new ideas for our chapters.

You might recall that in the last newsletter we made an appeal for a new webmaster. We are happy to report that Derrick Gonzales (pictured at right) has heard the call of duty and has responded, and will be flinging HTML code and stray bits and bytes all over our screens. Thanks, Derrick!

We also want to thank longtime webmaster Fabrice Corbatto for his dedicated efforts on the Chapter's behalf. Not only did he wrangle those same bits and bytes, but he added a certain Gallic *je ne sais quoi. Merci beaucoup*, M. Corbatto!

Those of a certain age will recall the phrase, "Hey, Joe" followed with, "Where you goin' with that gun in your hand?" But since the Joe in question is Joe Livingood, our Head Road Captain, it's more appropriate to ask "Where you goin' with that 'Glide in your hand?"

The format for this article is simple. I ask Joe questions and he answers them. Given the vast riding and Harley experience of the collective F-HOG tribe, this article could have easily been "Hey, Jack" or "Hey, Ray" or "Hey, Linda." But it's Hey Joe, for this month at least, because I identified him as a person who likes to write.

Bear in mind that I haven't been riding long so if my questions seem a little mundane, well - so am I.



(1) Hey, Joe, I ride a Harley Big Twin touring class bike, a 103 CID Twin Cam. It feels right to keep most of my riding within the powerband of the engine so as to not lug it. Does riding mostly around 3,000 RPM sound about right to you?

Well, it really depends on several factors, so this is going to be a long answer. If it's flat and open road, then, yes, 3,000 rpm is about right. If it's a mountain multiple-mile stretch with a ton of twisties, I'm going to be in the 3,250-4,000 range staying well in the upper powerband. This allows me to bleed off speed quickly by reducing throttle tension and gently applying the brakes. During rain events or poor road conditions, I try to reduce my RPMs so there is less torque available to the rear tire, which can help reduce the loss of rear tire traction when downshifting or during sudden unexpected maneuvers in poor weather conditions. Never lug your bike (when you're in too high of a gear and your bike must work extremely hard to deliver power), just like when you were a kid on your bike and trying to climb up a hill in fifth gear instead of first or second. It's all about getting to know your motorcycle and your riding limits and making sure both are working together.

(2) I learned about counter-steering, that mysterious way to direct a bike into turns and so forth, but when I counter-steer I feel a desire to have my upper body remain righted - that is, remain more or less vertical. Is this good technique, or should I lean my body more with the bike in turns?

This too depends on several factors such as rate of speed, degree of turn, road conditions, size and weight of rider and rider experience. Simply stated, counter-steering in a turn allows for the rider to lean into the turn, which then helps to equalize the centrifugal and gravitational forces on the motorcycle. There are a ton of video resources to help go into greater detail and I suggest attending a Friends Helping Friends riding activity at Patriot Harley-Davidson or enrolling in a Motorcycle Riding Concepts class to get additional hands-on experience.

(3) What sort of mileage should I be getting in my '16 Road King? Combined city/highway I get about 36 mpg. On the highway it's more like 41 mpg. Is this about right? I have no complaints with acceleration or deceleration popping.

Yep, you are about dead-on, depending upon the terrain and how aggressive you are on the throttle. Quick fuel savings tip: Buy a new air filter at least once every riding season or 5,000 miles, whichever comes first.

(4) I'm considering installing ape hangers. They look cool, or, as we used to say back in those politically incorrect Sixties, "bitchin'." How high should I go? Are there guidelines?

Go get fit by a qualified parts technician and check local and state laws and restrictions. Note that each state is different, so if you plan on riding in Maryland, D.C., or West Virginia you should research those states as well.

(5) Hey, Joe, when it's cold I wear long johns, but I have to confess, wearing a third layer of clothing makes certain necessary bio-functions more complicated. I mean, I get into the restroom and I know that what was there in the morning is still there somewhere, but it's so hard to negotiate those openings. Any advice?

If it's that cold out make sure it's a short ride and that you've emptied your bladder before hopping on your HOG!

(6) Do Harley enthusiasts have to be over age 50 to ride touring bikes with fairings? It kind of seems like it.

The old saying, "you get wiser with age" is true in this case. If I knew back then what I do now, I would have purchased a touring bike as my second bike instead of slowly moving from model to model. If you don't ride very much, then get what works for you and your budget. For someone like me who rides a lot and goes on multiple road trips, the decision is quite simple: Protection from the elements, cruise control, heated grips, tons of storage and a super comfortable touring seat all point to getting a touring model. I never have to pack for a ride because everything is already on my Ultra Limited.

I Like a Trike!

I confess to being interested in Harley Trikes. There's something about the three-wheel configuration and that storage space in the back that I just think is uber-cool. As the photo on the next page suggests, I was programmed to admire trikes from a very early age (that toy Police Trike must have been based on a Harley Servi-Car), and, indeed, when I was investigating the sport of motorcycle riding I was seriously considering buying a trike as my first ride. I may still own one someday!

So, Linda, tell us about trikes. Describe yours and tell us why you choose to ride one.

My trike is a 2015 Tri-Glide with the paint scheme called "Black Magic," which incorporates my favorite color: purple. I chose a trike as I thought it would be easier and faster to get back to my passion of riding after retiring.



What are the advantages and disadvantages of a trike?

The advantages of a trike are: More visibility on the roads; you don't have to put your feet down when stopping; it has a reverse gear to back up; there's no kick-stand (you have a parking brake); it's very comfortable



to ride.

The disadvantages of a trike are that it takes up an entire parking space, there's no such thing as power steering and it can be harder to maneuver through curves.

I remember being on a very hot HOGs ride to Gettysburg and back and seeing you remain relatively cool, calm and collected in a burdensome traffic jam equipped with radio, auxiliary electric motor fan and water bottle holder. Did you feel more comfortable than the two wheeled riders?

Yes! My auxiliary fans kept the engine heat to a minimum, thereby not putting stress on my engine

since it was a very hot day. I was able to stay hydrated more easily because with a cup holder I had easy access to my water bottle. I was also entertained with my music while riding.

What customization have you done with your trike? Are you planning anything more?

When I bought my trike new, I immediately had a rider backrest installed. Keep in mind I did not know how to ride a trike when I bought it, so there was a big incentive to learn how to ride! When I took the three-wheel riding course I found it difficult to pull the clutch in due to the spread between grip and lever. That is when I found out about adjustable levers, so I bought those and had them installed and, wow!, what a difference – my riding increased. The next customization I did was to raise the rear end by 1.25 inches which really helped with cornering and stabilization. Since then I have installed mud flaps, a higher windshield, a chrome rear fender guard, Love Jugs auxiliary fans, purple lighting around the engine and wheels for more visibility when night riding, Vance & Hines pipes to be heard, Stage 1 for better performance, LED front lights and Bright Ass Tail Lights, heated grips and seat as I ride all year long (weather permitting), and I replaced stock items with the Willie G. collection.

Do I plan any more customization? Well, I would like to add more lights to enhance visibility on the road but that would be it as I have really made the trike *my* ride.

Anything else you want to say about trike riding?

Yes! I have been laughed at and snide remarks made, "You are on a trike." Well, I will tell you, it is a lot harder

to ride a trike than a two wheel! First of all it is heavier... mine weighs 1,300 pounds without me on it and you are pushing and pulling to steer it versus leaning, even though in sharp curves you do lean a bit on the trike. Keep in mind there is no power steering, so your upper body is getting a real workout! [*Linda beat me in an arm-wrestling contest. That woman is formidable.—Wes*]

People also think I have a lot of storage because of the trunk, but it is not as large as it appears; depthwise, it does not go all the way back to the passenger seat. It is probably the size of two hard saddlebags together.

I love my trike and the adventures it has taken me on and look forward to many more! As many of my friends will tell you, my motto is, "It's always 70 degrees - let's ride!" (My other motto is, "I ride to live and love to ride.")

On a side note, Ben, our General Manger at Patriot Harley-Davidson, sold me my trike and thought, I'm sure, that I was crazy since I didn't know how to ride it from the start!



One of the conditions upon which I got this article was that I use a purple font. Linda really loves purple! By the way, that photo above is me in 1959 on my Harley Servi-car. I am three. So, you see, I'm a three-wheel admirer from a very early age. – Wes

VINTAGE RIDES

Last month we featured the last Harley that Elvis Presley ever owned. So let's continue with another! It's common knowledge that Elvis loved cars and motorcycles—especially motorcycles— and was a big fan of V-Twin Harleys. The King of Rock and Roll and Harley-Davidson... it just doesn't get any more iconically American than that unless you also throw in George Washington, a bald eagle, a slice of Mom's apple pie, a Fender Stratocaster and a pair of Levi's!

My friend Kelly owns a 1975 FLH 1200 - a Shovelhead and this is pretty cool. But, once again, it's

not as cool as Elvis' 1975 FLH 1200. Elvis bought his on October 24, 1974. It was an Electra-Glide, the only touring model offered by Harley at the time, and was black in color. The red, white and blue stripe on the tank is emblematic of AMF Harleys in the 1970s. You can see this bike today at South-East Harley-Davidson in Bedford Heights, Ohio.

Like the previous Elvis Harley we featured,

this, too, is a low mileage bike: only 2,982 miles on the odometer.

Taking it out and putting miles on it would almost seem like sacrilege, wouldn't it? The dealership has declined many offers to buy it, so there it will stay.

While I was at it, I couldn't help also including the 1956 photo of a 21-year-old Elvis on his red and white 1956 KH. *The Enthusiast* was published monthly by Harley-Davidson. This particular bike was Elvis' third.

Next time we'll feature some other cool old Harley. I'm thinking... **World War II**! —Wes





HOGs GLOSSARY—by Joe Livingood

Orange Calendar – An orange tri-fold listing of all FHOG chapter planned activities, distributed in late January each year. Always check the FHOG website for the most recent updates and calendar additions.

Boss Hog – Person(s) planning activity that comes up with activity idea, creates activity flyer, creates route sheet (if needed), gathers ride waivers day of activity (if needed) and recruits Road Captain(s) to lead each group if activity involves a motorcycle ride. *Not all activities include rides*, but some include both a ride and activity during or after a ride. At the conclusion of an activity, the Boss Hog is responsible for turning in all activity paperwork (Ride Summary and signed Ride Waivers) to FHOG Activities Officer.

Road Captain – The leader of each group ride who has obtained Road Captain status by successful completion of the Road Captain Seminar and on-road application. The Road Captain reviews the route put together by the Boss Hog. The Road Captain is responsible for getting the group safely from starting location to the ride's final stop and recruiting additional Road Captains for assistance as needed, considering length and complexity of the route. Road Captains are encouraged to pre-ride all activity routes shortly before activity date to ensure familiarity with route turns, road conditions and potential safety concerns for the entire group.

BOSS HOGS are key to the success of the Fairfax, VA HOG Chapter! Without dedicated BOSS HOGS, the Fairfax, VA HOG Chapter would not be able to offer nearly as many activities each year and they would not be nearly as successful as they are. Please note that you do not have to be a Road Captain to become a BOSS HOG!

Becoming a BOSS HOG can be achieved by planning an event. An "event" is described as a ride or a special activity (bowling, go cart, golfing, paint party, holiday party, etc.). As a BOSS HOG, you are the leader of your own, or a co-leader for another BOSS HOG's event. You accept responsibility for the event from start to finish. One of the benefits of accepting this responsibility is that you get to manage an event the way you want to (within reason, of course). This includes deciding what kind of ride it is, planning the destination and the route you want to ride, marketing your ride, determining the prizes, and more. Plus, being a BOSS HOG is a great way to have fun and meet new people and fellow riders.

However, your primary Activities Officer must review and approve your event, contest and its rules, content, etc., at least two weeks prior to the event. As the BOSS HOG for your event, we encourage you to create your own promotional material (flyers, email blasts, etc.) for your event. As the BOSS HOG for your event, we also en-

courage you to write one or more articles about your event for this newsletter.

As part of your responsibility prior to the event, you must contact hotels, restaurants and other venues at your destination early. During the event, you will have the opportunity to meet with volunteers and go over the final details of the event. You have all riders and passengers complete and sign a Release Form for each event, provide route sheets, and organize riding groups (with Ride Leaders & Tail Gunners). After the event, make sure you accurately track and record event finances and return the following items to your primary Activities Officer: 1) The Post-Event Summary (completed), 2) Chapter money (if any), and 3) Signed Release and Tally Forms.

We ask all Fairfax, VA HOG Chapter members to please get involved and consider becoming a BOSS HOG! Your time, effort and support for our Chapter is greatly appreciated!







The bike started up. Better rev the engine a dozen times to make sure.



BOOK REVIEW by Wes Clark


One Down, Four Up: My Bikes, My Life by Nigel M. Sainsbury (Nigel Sainsbury Consulting LLC, Fairfax, VA, 2019, 315 pages) <u>This book is in the Fairfax County library system!</u>

Do you think of yourself as a biker or a motorcyclist? My very first article for this newsletter was a book review of a work by Sonny Barger; as he was a Hell's Angel, he's most certainly a biker. The book under review is by an enthusiast that one would have to call a sober and responsible motorcyclist - and a British one at that. *One Down, Four Up* is an amusing, light-hearted and easy-to-read book about a fellow who was possessed by the two-wheeled bug from an early age. He describes the various underpowered

mopeds he owned as a teen, and then the larger and faster motorcycles he bought as an adult. Some of his descriptions of mishaps and adventures are classic; his account of being in a British hospital as a result of an especially bad accident with a lorry and not being able to defecate - until a certain occasion - is unforgettable. Disgusting, but unforgettable. Later chapters describe his ambitious goal to ride around the Australian continent and into Asia - complete with logo, Facebook page and electronic location tracking.

A couple of excerpts illustrate the writer's engaging literary style:

"How I never got any speeding tickets on this bike is still a mystery to me. I am not a fast rider per se, but I do like to ride the bikes I have as they were designed and built to be ridden. The (Triumph) Speed Triple was made for North Yorkshire's twisty roads and the name said it all. Having a bright yellow bike in summer and living in a rural area, both the bike and I were magnets for flies, bugs, bees and just about any insect around as it clearly looked like a flower to them. Albeit a very fast flower. Even stopping at traffic lights for a few seconds would attract a swarm of insects. It was a pain in the arse, and the bloody bugs would get everywhere;



in my helmet, up my nose, in my eyes and all over my body and the bike. There was no fairing on the bike either - nothing to stop or even slow the little critters down before they hit me, so I used to get plenty of protein in the summer from eating these damn insects."

We've all been there, haven't we? Anyone who has ever taken a nice long ride in Virginia in the summer can relate. Here's another about the hazards of wearing a full-face helmet without a visor:

"I suffered my second bird strike on the (Yamaha) XS 500, this time in broad daylight on a beautiful day and doing around 50 mph. A small bird (I have no clue what species of bird it was) with dark feathers went straight into my Griffin full face crash helmet. My visor was up, and the bird hit the right side of my face wedging itself between the side of my head and the inside of my crash helmet. It just missed my right eye. I never even seen it coming until its beak hit me and then I suffered some immediate pain as its beak and claws tore the skin off the side of my face. It continued into the dead end which was the back of my crash helmet. There were feathers and blood everywhere and I could immediately smell the bird's natural fragrance as it filled the air space within the helmet. I am assuming it was a natural fragrance and not an almighty bird fart let loose from its impact into my face. The whole event was over in just a few seconds. I think the bird panicked more than I did and was wriggling like a worm on a fish hook before I managed to pull it out of my face. I maintained control of the bike and stopped without any drama and wondered what the hell had just happened. My riding mate, like all good biking mates, just pissed himself laughing."

The author owned only one Harley, a 2006 Sportster. Most of his bikes were Japanese. Nevertheless, *One Down, Four Up: My Bikes, My Life* is certainly worth a read for Harley fanatics and is highly recommended. (The book's title will puzzle non-motorcyclists, but we all get it.) If I had any complaints about this work I'd note that the many photographs are a bit too small, but they illustrate his mopeds and motorcycles adequately. Interestingly, the author lives in Fairfax, VA! Perhaps one of you know him...?

HISTORIC HARLEY

What's going on at left?

This photo was taken by Bill Ray as part of his Life Magazine commission to photograph the Berdoo (San Bernadino) chapter of the Hells Angels in 1965. These guys are AMA (American Motorcycle Association) onlookers taking their own photos of outlaw bikers with Polaroid Land cameras—which do a pretty lousy job of capturing action. (I know—I had one.) Note the Schott Perfecto-style jackets and the captain's caps. Those caps were very popular; a vintage one is shown below. In good condition they're worth hundreds of dollars nowadays!

As we all surely know, 1965 was an important year in Harley-Davidson history. It was the first year for the electric starter, the first year for the 12-volt system and the last year for the Panhead V-twin engine.





The engine at left is, of course, a Harley-Davidson Panhead of the 1955-1962 era. This particular restored engine is going for \$6,000 on e-Bay! You can clearly see from this rarely-seen angle why these engines were called panheads; those do indeed look like cooking pans.

The panhead was a two-valve-per-cylinder, pushrod Vtwin, made in both 61 c.i. (EL models) and 74 c.i. (FL and FLH models) displacements. The "Captain America" chopper used by Peter Fonda in the movie *Easy Rider* (1969) had a panhead engine. Can you dig it?


